

# The Board at Work



### Community Garden Sub-Committee (of StreetLIFE)

The Community Garden Sub-Committee (CGC) enjoyed a fruitful year which carried the Fair-field-Gonzales neighbourhood several steps closer to getting its first community garden. In February 2012 the CGC submitted a proposal to the City of Victoria to establish a permaculture commons in Robert Porter Park. The proposal is currently in review by the Parks Department. Pending approval, the proposal will then be forwarded to city council for their consideration. In April 2012 the CGC hosted an afternoon forum on food security, titled Fairfield Garden Matters, which gathered an audience of some 25 people. In May 2012 members of the CGC up-potted several perennial food-bearing plants, including Desert King fig, edible chestnut, and Red Flowering currant, destined for the proposed permaculture commons. The CGC eagerly awaits the coming year and all it offers for the community. ### Plastics Recycling

For the past thirteen years, the FGCA has operated a flourishing community-based plastics recycling program for local residents that has recycled over 250 three-ton truckloads of plastics and provided \$35,000 to the Association. Volunteers – who have made the whole program possible - donate nearly one thousand hours annually.

New program ideas implemented within the past year have been: a free "re-useables area" that keeps serviceable plastic objects out of the recycling stream, a method that allows depot users to donate directly to the Association, and a targeted promotional flyer campaign.

Another change came by way of the CRD. In May 2012, the Blue Box program expanded to include milk cartons and Tetrapaks. These have historically accounted for ~15% of total volume at the depots.

Despite the ongoing success of the program, volumes and revenue have been slowly and steadily declining over the past 3 years. The primary reason is that there are simply more options to the public to recycle items (a good thing). Materials that will remain unique to the plastic recycling depots for the time being, will be styrofoam, soft plastics, oversized plastics, and mixed paper (though some of these are accepted at the Hartland Landfill).

Nevertheless, there is much potential to expand the service, as many households in Fairfield still do not participate in the program (~1000 do). With targeted promotion, the program could well flourish, in some form, for many years.

Many residents bring recyclables to the depots on behalf of others: their work-place, a family member, neighbour or friend.

For your next visit, think about helping out someone else, and double your recycling karma!

### Plastics Recycling in Fairfield

The following materials can be recycled at the monthly depots:

Styrofoam, soft plastics, all hard plastics, foil bags, mixed paper products, batteries, electronics, small appliances, milk cartons and tetrapaks, bicycle tires & tubes.

A modest fee is collected, a portion of which is donated back to the community association. Refundable container revenue is given to local charities.

### Family Programs By Ro Fife, By Ro Fife, Family Programs Coordinator

Family Programs at the Place remain a small but vital community gateway for many caregivers of young children in south Victoria. The primary goal of our Family programs is the need to support and engage primary caregivers as the most important influence in the life of a young child. Our programming continues to feature caregiver and child drop in sessions. The Fairfield Five Points Preschool rounds out our formal programming. We have revitalized parent education offerings through the Laugh and Learn... then Lunch group which runs parallel to parent and tot drop-ins on Thursdays. Another activity which has been restructured and revitalized is the family-focused clothing swap now scheduled monthly on Saturdays.

These programs continue to create opportunities for young families to build connections and learn together through social, educational and recreational activities at the Place. Participant feedback for our programs has highlighted their appreciation for regular opportunities to meet others undertaking the challenging and often isolating job of parenting. The Health Promotion division of Public Health Agency of Canada continues to be the primary funder of our drop-in programming. We rebooted our parent education and support group, reestablishing it as a weekly support group with a shared meal. We now offer this session as a concurrent group while our regular drop-in happens, to best engage parents with very young children. Laugh and Learn ...then Lunch has grown in popularity and enables parents to both have an adult conversation and share a meal with others.

### Community Recreation

Once again, recreation programs at the FGCA are anchored by five popular instructors/programs: Lauren Cox (Iyengar Yoga), Jordan Hanson (African Hand Drumming), Isabel Santos (Zumba/ Zumba Toning), Richardson Sports (Sportball), and Heidi Fink (Cooking). These programs are responsible for over 90 percent of the participants in FGCA recreation programs!

This year the FGCA experimented with offering more courses at times we had not offered programming in the past, with mixed results. We offered Zumba classes on Friday mornings at 7am; and Parent and Tot Yoga classes on Mondays and Wednesdays after lunch; and Self Shiatsu classes on Saturdays during our administrative hours. We managed to run half of the classes at less than half capacity, but the upside is that new instructors get an opportunity to gage the viability of running the course at the centre.

Another notable challenge to registration came in the Winter and Spring session as numbers were significantly lower in many of the cooking classes, with about half of the classes offered being canceled. The goal for next year is to re-package our cooking classes in a way that differentiates us from the new competition of high-end cooking classes opening up in the downtown area.

Picking up the slack this year was the addition of a new program called Nia Dance that ran on Tuesday evenings, each session with 75-100 percent capacity. Nia Dance is an excellent example of a program that started out in one of the FGCA's small and less used rooms at a time when it could be adequately supported by our administrative team without straining the FGCA's limited resources. Nia's instructor, Deborah Redfern, (right) had her own marketing strategy and was willing to adapt her program's needs to the FGCA's available resources in order to run a successful class. Well done!

### Out of School Care

This year the FGCA Out of School Care (OSC) programs delivered high quality child care to over 150 children and their families in the Fairfield Gonzales community. Staffing was a challenge as returning staff went on to other pursuits after completing their education. While the task of training can be daunting, the FGCA successfully hired upwards of ten new staff members, who brought fresh enthusiasm and variety to the program.

There was also a change in managers at the start of the 2011/2012 school year, with Caroline Roberts taking over at Margaret Jenkins OSC and Ashlee Daidone at Sundance OSC. The springtime brought more changes as Candace Negm, Child Care Coordinator for the past five years, made the exciting transition into motherhood. The ripple effect resulted in opportunities of growth for some of our current staff members. I, Sarah Angus, as the previous Fairfield OSC Manager, moved into the Child Care Coordinator role. Ashlee Daidone, Sundance OSC Manager, took on the larger program of Fairfield OSC, and a front line staff member, Katelyn Burke, stepped up to the task of managing Sundance OSC.

As in recent years, Fairfield was the largest OSC program in 2011/12. It occupies four of the six rooms within the FGCA's main building. The second largest program is Margaret Jenkins OSC, utilizing two portables and the brick annex on the school grounds. Sundance OSC, our smallest program, runs daily out of the gym in the school itself.

Winter and Spring camps saw a large influx this past year as families filled the spaces and leaving a small waitlist on many days. The FGCA successfully applied for and received a Canada Summer Jobs Grant of \$6456.00, which allowed us to hire a student manager for our 2012 program. The grant assisted in funding the 14 week position, which was awarded to an internal candidate, Katie Lore. Registration numbers were a challenge again this summer and we were forced to cut our camp spaces from 40 down to 20 in 6 of the 8 weeks. Despite this set back our experienced and enthusiastic team provided excellent care throughout the summer.

### Youth Programs

The 2011/2012 school year was an exciting time for youth programs at the FGCA. In late September 2011, the long-awaited designated youth space was completed. Existing FGCA youth programs, like Chill Zone and Jump N Start, as well as South Island Pride Community Centre's (SIPCC) W.H.A.T. program, are now revived thanks to this accessible, resourced space just for youth. Promoting these programs in various school classrooms built rapport with over 72 youth from grades five through eight in the local community, and a resulted in a year of memorable friendships and fun! NEW Youth Zone!

In addition to these programs, the FGCA envisioned creating another afterschool drop-in to provide experiential learning and leadership to youth in grades five and six transitioning from the OSC programs to the bustling Victoria youth scene.

In October 2011, a pilot of the Youth Zone program was launched. With nine youth enrolled, the Youth Zone participants took part in various team-building and leadership activities, attended weekly workshops, and hosted community barbeques while making new friends. A highlight of the year was the Youth Zone's participation in the Anti-Bullying Film Festival hosted by the Boys and Girls Club Services of Victoria.

### Local Bank Shows Support For Youth

Community members were joined by a volunteer team from the RBC in Cook Street Village to take part in the City of Victoria sponsored program called VTAG - Victoria Together Against Graffiti. Thirteen volunteers took to the streets surrounding the Fairfield Community Place to remove graffiti and to repaint hydro poles. The RBC team used this volunteer opportunity to access their Community Service program and raise \$2000.00 for the FGCA's youth programs!



### Administration

Our team's goal is to support program delivery, from a helpful, welcoming public access point, to our well-maintained, behind the scenes, infrastructure. We had many successes this past year.

Reception was, as usual, busy, unpredictable and rewarding. Pippa Davis and Vanya McDonell balanced the demands of secretarial work with the random tangents of reception. Pippa Davis enjoyed completing a yearlong cycle of our Program Guide, with lots of positive staff and community feedback, as well as contributing to the planning and production of the Observer Newsletter. The reception team also functioned as the FGCA's communications hub, maintaining our website and membership database.

Despite the withdrawal of funding for the Community Access Program through Industry Canada, we continue to offer free computer and internet access to the public. Operations Director Ro Fife and Bookkeeper Pam Norman smoothly transitioned the change of our fiscal year end to July 31st, in addition to maintaining the daily finance and operations routines.

Often, it seems, the work of the administration team goes unnoticed; we take that as an indicator that our systems are working well!



### Facility

### Youth and Family Counselors

A unique program under the oversight of the FGCA is the youth and family counselor (YFC) staffing for many of the schools in the Greater Victoria district. We employ 17 YFCs, equating to 13.2 FTE positions, supporting the students and families in 13 schools ranging from elementary to secondary. Together these counselors take on a service caseload of over 90 individuals and/or families.

#### What do they do?

YFC staff are tasked with providing counseling services to students with an overarching goal of improving their relationships and school attachment. This work is rich and varied, with many staff working as the only non-school district staff in the school environment. Being employed by the community association provides these counselors with a neutrality and independence that enhances the work.

### How is FGCA involved?

The YFC contract has grown over the past twenty years, initially employing one counselor to now serving six of the seven family of schools for the district. As a strong believer in partnerships, we also sub-contract some of this work (approximately 8 FTE) to Blanshard Community Centre to anchor those staff positions in their traditional community agency. Our current contract is valued at over one million dollars each school year, and greatly offsets our core operating and administration staffing costs.

#### Why the FGCA is involved?

As the contracted partner with the school district, the FGCA earned a valuable reputation as a progressive service provider grounded in community. This YFC service is a logical extension of our family-focused centre which values the concept that it takes a village to build a healthy community. Keeping youth in school is a key pillar in that village.

Proof is in the pudding – volunteerism works! From designing info-graphics to story writing, volunteers are building organizational capacity at the FGCA. These volunteers provide support across this non-profit organization by leading and facilitating projects that would not exist otherwise. Built on a strong history in volunteerism, the community association was launched by a group of dedicated residents and nurtured over the years by board members, who have built what we are today, a neighbourhood-based service provider.

By dedicating efforts in volunteer coordination beyond existing programs and services, this past year was focused on welcoming and recruiting new volunteers. This work has been particularly rewarding as efforts are not so much geared towards management, but rather engagement. As part of a community engagement strategy, volunteerism harnesses the power of social capital. Social capital is about relationship-building, and about the sparks that develop in the form of ideas, action and visions when people are connecting and working together for a common cause.

My favorite thing to hear from a volunteer is, 'I'm so excited about this project' or 'I've been thinking about this project and have some ideas'. These words, to me, signal meaningful involvement!



### ORGANIZATIONAL AND INDIVIDUAL DONATIONS
