This has been a year of preparing for significant changes in staff executive leadership at the FGCA. As our long term Executive Director plans for retirement, the Board has been actively involved in planning for her succession and for a smooth transition to a new leadership model.

Board renewal is also an important focus, as there will be a number of new board members after this year's AGM. Together with the impending staffing changes and new leadership, this will require a significant investment of time and training for the organization.

Community programs remain a key focus of the FGCA. We see an ever increasing need for child care and support for families. With physical space often being our biggest limitation, the organization continues to actively explore options for increasing child care spaces for families.

Under the umbrella of local area planning, the FGCA has sought renewal of the Cook Street Village plan for the last 12 years. The city declined to update any local plans until after the Official Community Plan (OCP) was updated, a process that took over five years and was adopted in 2012. There is now an urgency to update local area plans, in order to provide better framework and direction for the development pressure that our neighbourhood is facing. We continue to work with the FGCA community, other community associations and through our Planning and Zoning Committee to address these issues.

A heartfelt thank you to Joan Kotarski for her many years of leadership. The FGCA was transformed from a small organization to a major service organization meeting the needs of Fairfield and Gonzales neighbourhoods during her 19 years. I have had the privilege of working with her since 2001 and I have seen her wisdom and ability to nurture staff and community development first hand. Her gain of more time for other pursuits and personal priorities is our loss but her legacy will live on.

This time of renewal provides an excellent opportunity to forge new relationships and partnerships with FGCA members, other neighborhoods, other community service groups and governments for the betterment of our community for all. We look forward to maintaining our commitment to board training and staff development, investing in people for another 40 years.

Streetlife was involved with Community Outreach - both at the Moss Street Market and Fall Fairfield, 2014. Community maps asking "How Alive is Your Street?" and intriguing visitors to plot where food gardens, backyard chickens, & food-bearing trees/shrubs were located were hugely popular.

Streetlife members continued to support the 2nd annual Community-Wide Yard Sale/Donation/Recycle event held in May, 2015. The yard sales increased from 18 "neighbourhood dusters" in the first year to almost 50 this past year! And St. Matthias and Fairfield United both hosted sale tables. The Salvation Army was hard-pressed to handle all the donation pick-ups and so Clothesline helped out.

Streetlife created the Poetry & Performance Open Mic series, last Sunday of the month 7 - 9pm @ the Garry Oak Room. Since its inception in January 2015, Streetlife has hosted monthly Open Mic events drawing enthusiastic audiences. These events drew local performers (the first half was an open mic) and the second half featured a performance by a talented musician, poet or spoken word artist.

PLASTIC RECYCLING Susanna Grimes, Coordinator

Saturday June 27th was a bittersweet day for the Fairfield **Gonzales Community Association's Plastics Recyding** program. After a fabulously successful 16-year run, the final depot took place. While many were sad to see its end, this is actually a positive sign, reflecting an evolution in environmental awareness and the corresponding publicly available services created in response.

Once upon a time in 1998, the Environment Committee of the FGCA hatched an idea to address growing concerns about environmental degradation, while enabling local residents to take action in a tangible, individual way: plastics recycling. At that time, no plastics were accepted in the curbside blue boxes, only glass, tin and newspapers.

A pilot depot was launched in May 1999 at Eberts Park, which – after only a couple of months proved to be so popular that additional depots were planned at Chapman Park, Sir James Douglas School, St. Matthias Church, the Canadian Red Cross and on Olive Street. A few months later, hundreds of households in Fairfield and Gonzales were participating. Due to falling revenues over time, our business partner requested amalgamation of the sites into two.

Our business partner – originally Planet Recycling and later Pacific Mobile Depots - provided bags, trucking and some trained staff. Twenty percent of the revenue from fees charged by our business partner was returned to the FGCA.

The program initially targeted hard plastics, which were then delivered to a local business (Syntal) that turned them into plastic lumber. Over the years, it evolved to include a wider range of plastic products - a reflection of an emerging and variable market, as well as the ability of our business partner to accept and find an end use for the products. These included soft plastics, Styrofoam, gable-top containers, Tetrapaks, foil bags, e-waste, mixed paper, etc. Refundable beverage containers that were turned in helped support local charities.

The program was expected to be in operation for only a few years - perhaps five at most - until the blue box system would eventually accept all packaging and recyclables. Although that day has still not come, thankfully there are now other options to satisfy the public's demand for recycling.

We accomplished what we set out to do, and more. With the help of thousands of volunteer hours, our partners, and the guidance of FGCA staff, the program has:

- Diverted over 300 x 3-ton truckloads of plastics from the landfill representing 600-800 households.
- Shipped and processed plastics as locally and as responsibly as possible.
- Helped a small business grow to the point that they are expanding to other parts of the province.
- Eliminated multiple vehicle trips that hundreds of residents would have had to make.
- Created places where people can mingle and feel part of a community and a successful environmental initiative.
- Helped spawn similar projects in other areas: James Bay, Fernwood, Oak Bay and Esquimalt.
- Generated over \$50,000 for the FGCA and local charities.
- Educated residents about the issues and challenges involved in recycling packaging and other products.
- Won the 2010 CRD EcoStar Award for Waste Reduction by a non-profit group.

It has been a visible, and positive, values-based expression of the Fairfield Gonzales Community Association's mission: to enhance the quality of life in Fairfield by involving community members in identifying and acting on the needs of area residents. It has also demonstrated the commitment of residents to recycle more products, and the viability of expanding the regional recycling program to include a wider range of plastics.

PLANNING & ZONING George Zador, Chair

The Planning and Zoning Committee is mandated by the City of Victoria to receive and review proposals for development involving land use rezoning in the Fairfield-Gonzales community, prior to their formal submission to the City. The Committee holds Community Meetings where such proposals are presented to the affected public. Reporting back to the City, it acts as the voice of the community regarding the effects of the development on the neighbourhood. The projects may be as small as a single family zoned lot seeking rezoning for a garden suite, or as complex as a large high-rise apartment building covering several lots.

In the past year, only 10 projects were presented at 7 meetings however, two major proposals created ongoing controversy and public engagement.

The commercial/residential building on Cook St at Oliphant, as well as the Mount St. Angela Senior's Complex proposals continue to be at crossroads with some community interests.

The Committee has responded to a significant number of contacts from the community and also attended several informational functions hosted by the City of Victoria.

COMMUNITY GARDEN FOOD FOREST Emily Hull, Community Garden Volunteer Coordinator

The garden, now fondly referred to as the Fairfield Food Forest, is thriving. Most plants have been in the ground for approximately 2 ½ years and have well established root systems thanks to our irrigation system that carried us through a very dry summer. A work party in October 2014 saw a record number of volunteers, with steady participation continuing throughout the year. This May, plants were added and irrigation expanded. Well attended work parties and an expanding contact list indicate that community participation continues to grow.

The Food Forest, as the plants take up more space, is becoming a place of its own. The children at Moss Rock preschool have been exploring the plants and were able to enjoy fresh Goumi and Haskap berries in June. School aged kids could be spotted wandering through the garden on their way home from Sir James Douglas with strawberries in their hands. Curious passersby are stopping and noticing the plants. We are looking forward to installing signage that will aid in educating the community about the Food Forest, as well as communicate upcoming events related to the place.

What's next? Work parties will continue with emphasis on sheet mulching and planting. We will look at ways to define walkways in order to protect the root system of the plants, install signage, and continue our efforts to secure approval and funding for a few amenities on site, particularly a garden shed and bench. Efforts will be made to increase communication via social media in order to grow our volunteer base and make the Food Forest more accessible to its community.

OUT OF SCHOOL CARE Kristina Wilcox, Coordinator

Our licensed Out of School Care programs consist of both before and after school care. Our Before School Program begins at 7:30am and our After School program ends at 6:00pm. Our OSC programs service Margaret Jenkins Elementary and Sir James Douglas Elementary and, additionally, consist of Seasonal and Pro-D Day camps which are offered to all members of the community. This year our programs have worked hard to adopt a strong child-led, exploration based program. Additionally, we have grown our relationships with other departments in the agency in order to give our programs a stronger community voice.

Our Margaret Jenkins Program expanded by 24 spaces this year. We licensed the Margaret Jenkins Gymnasium to run an additional before and after school care program. In response, we added an additional manager position to the OSC team (MJ Assistant manager) and were able to employ 2 additional leaders. Our Summer program also expanded by 20 spaces and ran for 8 weeks of the summer.

Moss Rock Preschool is a licensed preschool that runs Monday- Friday between the hours of 9am and 12pm. The Preschool offers 2-5 day registrations for children aged 2.5-5 years old and is based out of Fairfield Place. Moss Rock identifies itself as a child-centred, nature and exploration based program that nurtures individual needs.

It is an on-going pleasure to see students and their families make life long connections in our program and are always pleased to see alumni families return with their second and third child to our preschool. Our dedicated staff truly model the proverb, that it takes a village to raise a child.

The FGCA ran its registered Youth Zone program Mondays to Wednesdays, and its drop-in Chill Zone program after school at the Fairfield Community Place's youth space.

The FGCA also continued to run its outreach mentorship Jump N Start program at Central Middle School and George Jay Elementary School after school on Thursday and Fridays, respectively, And thanks to a two year grant from the United Way we began a new high-school aged leadership program on Friday evenings. All of the programs ran at near or full capacity throughout the year.

FALL FAIRFIELD HARVEST FETE

In its fourth year, Fall Fairfield 2014 saw the benefit of becoming a known event in the community. Many residents looked forward to it as the seasons changed, and it had a truly local flavour. The event met its food awareness goals very well through a strong presence from the garden committee and a new pre-fete baking day which brought together many community members in collecting apples and baking together. It also met its arts goals through the participation of Fairfield Stories Mural Project and the now familiar 'harvest hats', which were a big hit with all ages. With music, dancing, and festivities throughout the day, it was a unique chance to celebrate our neighbourhood.

ART AT THE PLACE

This year, the foyer of Fairfield Community Place was adorned with the works of four local artists and two community projects. Joanna Saunders, Joan Cahill, Laurie McAmmond and Robert Ives all had a chance to display their art and brighten our space. We also hosted a collection of photos from our Artists Alive summer camp and art pieces made during our Fairfeld Stories Mural Project. Four volunteers have worked to curate the space, with Diane Salmon taking a lead on engaging artists and hosting receptions

OBSERVER NEWSPAPER

The Observer newspaper continued to inform and engage our community, published twice a year with a distribution of 5,000 copies per issue. A strong team of contributors wrote on all sorts of topics, from travel to cooking to the arts. The support of local advertisers makes the newspaper possible, and we were happy to welcome a new volunteer, Kevin, in 2014 to do copy editing and another, Kyle, in 2015 who worked to deliver the paper to neighbourhood hubs.

PLANTING SEEDS GROWING COMMUNITY

The FGCA undertook outreach to the community on sustainability issues at our Moss Street Market Booth in 2014. Volunteers led participants in activities such as ecological footprint calculators, local food mapping, and compost bin liner origami. Partner organizations such as World Fisheries Trust, BC Sustainable Energy Alliance, and Victoria Emergency Management Agency were invited as guest presenters to showcase their contribution to sustainability in our neighbourhood.

FAIFIELD STORIES MURAL PROJECT

In 2014, the FGCA received a Community Arts Grant from the City of Victoria to create new public art with the Fairfield Stories Mural Project, led by professional artist Carolyn Knight. Carolyn engaged the community in art-making workshops throughout the fall, both public and in FGCA programs. She asked participants to make their mark with stamps, printmaking, painting and drawing, and to write letters to the future and past people of Fairfield Gonzales. Volunteer Marissa Hoen worked as a mentored artist to help engage community residents. About 350 people participated, and the artworks they created were digitized. They were then compiled by graphic designer Joan Cahill, working with the artist, into the final mural piece, which is installed on a shipping container behind Fairfield Community Place to bring joy to the many users and passersby that see it each day

YOUTH & FAMILY COUNSELLORS Ro Fife, Administrator


A unique program under the oversight of the FGCA is the youth and family counselor (YFC) staffing for many of the schools in the Greater Victoria district. YFC staff are tasked with providing counseling services to students with an overarching goal of improving their relationships and school attachment. This work is rich and varied, with many staff working as the only non-school district staff in the school environment. Even during the challenges of the public school strike in September 2015 our talented and resourceful staff continued to serve their students with creative ways to connect in the community and building shared resources.

WORKING AT FAIRFIELD
