As we head into our fifth year as Co-executive Directors, we are thinking a lot about transition. Part of the reason we are drawn to community work is that no two days are the same, and change is the only constant. Instead of trying to stop it, we choose to expect and adapt to changes as they come.

We have seen changes in people. With unemployment at its lowest in decades, we are seeing many transitions in our staff team as people move on to new and exciting opportunities. In our neighbourhood, demographics are shifting, requiring us to adapt in new ways. There are both more children and more seniors in our community; how do we continue to serve them with a shrinking workforce? How do we keep our neighbourhood livable as it grows?

We have seen changes in relationships. Our relationships with Indigenous Canadians are shifting as we begin to learn their truths and work toward reconciliation. How do we make sure we are good neighbours? How do we move towards becoming allies?

We have seen changes in the weather. Climate change is progressing, and will continue to affect weather patterns and migration across the globe. The sooner we adapt, the more successful we will be in mitigating its effects. How do we plan and act at the neighbourhood level?

Luckily, in our work we are not alone. Fairfield Gonzales has a vast wealth of human capital. Ours is a neighbourhood full of knowledgeable, passionate, creative people; people who are not afraid to face change and work together to shape it. As we connect and collaborate, we become something greater than the sum of its parts and become more resilient in the face of change.

We have seen transition on a personal level, too. Kristina has become a parent this year, probably the biggest transition anyone navigates in their life. As Kristina shifts into a year of parental leave, the rest of the team adapts to a year without her leadership. We are fortunate that our work thus far has taught us to approach this transition with curiosity, flexibility, and excitement for what comes next.

STRATEGIC PLANNING SUBCOMMMITTEE

The Strategic Planning Subcommittee is a subcommittee of the Executive Committee, which this year consisted of five board members. This subcommittee's purpose is to assist the Board and Executive members in producing a document which outlines a plan that contains goals and objectives for the association to invest in for the next four years. This plan contains strategies which are committed to helping the association to better meet its mission statement and mandates, while maximizing its ability to create public value for the communities it serves.

ACHIEVEMENTS

Proposed and passed a motion to engage in strategic planning in April 2019

Facilitated a focus group that produced the association's list of strengths, weaknesses, opportunities and challenges in May 2019.

Used data from the focus group to develop strategies for the association to adhere to for the next four years in June 2019; they are: Partnership, Diversity and Inclusion, Community Engagement, Funding, and Strategic Management. An action plan was produced which will be shared with the public by 2020.

Gave staff the opportunity to offer their contributions to the strategic planning process in September 2019.

Have begun to implement some of the plan's strategies into the various committees by September 2019. An example of this is the Streetlife committee which is pursuing an asset-mapping project.

COMMUNITY GARDEN COMMITTEE AND FAIRFIELD FOOD FOREST

The Fairfield Food Forest is a community garden located in Porter Park, near the intersection of Kipling Street and Thurlow Road. A passionate group of dedicated residents created this garden in 2013. As this permaculture garden continues to grow it will become a food producing forest.

Throughout the year, the Food Forest hosts community work bees, Early Years programming, and community-wide workshops. In March, gardening expert Bobby Arbess hosted a free workshop on pruning techniques specific to the Food Forest plants.

This spring, we offered two Family programs in the Food Forest, "Learning to Grow" and "Friends of Porter Park". This was an opportunity for young ones to drop-in with their parents and caregivers to explore, to garden, to play and to build community. Our Moss Rock and Five Points preschools and our Camas Early Years Centre included work bees into their programming this Spring, allowing our early learners to explore soil, to plant, and to harvest. A kindergarten class at Sir James Douglas also took part in a work bee, building community within the youngest members of the community.

The Food Forest relies heavily on volunteers. We have been fortunate to have a core group and always welcome new volunteers. This year work parties included high school students from Glenlyon Norfolk School, Sir James Douglas' Me-To-We Club as well as early learners from our programs, resulting in more work being completed, increased education, and awareness about the forest and local food security.

Thanks to the City of Victoria's "My Great Neighbourhood Grant" and funding from the FGCA, the Food Forest was able to hire a local builder to build and install fencing in some areas.

What is next? Our priority in 2020 will be to access funding to fence the remaining areas. We also want to strengthen our relationship with the FGCA Early Years programs, possibly creating a "friendship garden" for growing plants that could be used for tea. Also, our new metal plant signage will list plant origin, nutritional value and harvesting information.

NEIGHBOURHOOD IMPROVEMENT COMMITTEE

This year the FGCA Board created the Neighbourhood Improvement Committee. This committee has a mandate to work on projects relevant to social justice, environmental sustainability, the built environment, urban form, transportation, parks, and related matters so as to improve our neighbourhood.

So far, our members have started working on traffic calming on streets impacted by motor vehicles, implementation of the City's Greenways Plan, and implementation of the City's Climate Leadership Plan, and is looking ahead to addressing affordable housing and Go Victoria (the City's upcoming transportation plan).

Like other board committees, we run on volunteer energy, so please feel free to drop by if you are interested in the above issues or others.

GOVERNANCE COMMITTEE

The Governance Committee is a standing committee of the Board. Its purpose is to assist the Board to fulfill its legal, ethical, and functional responsibilities through, amongst other things, the maintenance of the constitution and bylaws, policy development, and committee terms of reference.

Over the past year the Governance Committee's primary contributions have been conducting a review of the FGCA human resource policies, as well as a review of all terms of reference for Board committees. The Governance Committee worked with FGCA senior leadership to review over 30 organizational and HR policies. The Governance Committee has also been hard at work reviewing all Board committee terms of reference to ensure these documents are consistent, compliant with the recently updated committee terms of reference policy, and user friendly so they can be easily relied upon to direct committee work.

The Governance Committee is currently compromised of 3 Board members, but has previously included hardworking volunteers with a zest for organizational governance from the FGCA membership base. Sounds like something you might be interested in? Please connect with us!

COMMUNITY ASSOCIATION LAND USE COMMITTEE (CALUC)

This report represents an approximation of the work the CALUC has done over the year.

At the height of membership, the CALUC had 10 members; currently there are five members. The CALUC was saddened to lose David Barlow to cancer this year and his energy, expertise and humour continues to be missed. Joanne Thibault left the committee in the winter and in July the committee witnessed a mass resignation of Chair Alice Albert, and long-standing members Susan Kainer, Robin Jones and David Wales. All these departures were due to irreconcilable differences. CALUC welcomed a new member, Michael Hirsch, who joined current members Kevin White (Acting Chair), Joanna Fox (Acting Vice Chair), Don Monsour and Nic Humphries. Thanks to a new application process developed by the FCGA Board of Directors, a slate of up to 9 committee members will be appointed.

This past year the CALUC held preliminary and community meetings nearly twice monthly to meet the demand of development in the community. There were two Community Meetings held for a second time on new multi-unit developments, and 10 Community Meetings for applications that included site specific zoning, rezoning, and variances. Property development spanned from new builds to Heritage-property renovations. Community engagement was extensive for the multi-unit developments on Fairfield (the Rhodo) and Heywood. Attendance for Community Meetings fluctuated; it must be noted that there is concern by the community that the City of Victoria's meeting notices to those within 100m of the proposed development are not being received, or are not being received with adequate notice to enable attendance. It should also be noted that all of the new developments are including appropriate bike storage and two of the multi-unit development proposals are designated for apartments not condos. Parking, traffic, tree-canopy preservation, and development height continue to be the main concerns for all developments.

OUT OF SCHOOL CARE

Our Out of School Care (OSC) Programs, servicing primarily Margaret Jenkins Elementary and Sir James Douglas Elementary, saw an increase in registrants over the 2018-19 year, due to an increase in physical capacity with the School District's construction of two Learning Studio portables for joint use.

Our goal for the program is to provide a welcoming and stimulating environment where children can feel at home, grow, learn, and have fun. Our daily activities include out-trips, crafts, free play, sports activities, and lots of time outside enjoying our wonderful natural spaces.

A few highlights of the year were the ÉMJS OSC Carnival Event; the FFOSC first annual multi-age soccer tournament; and the annual Family Appreciation BBQ, which we estimate had 350 attendees.

CAMPS

To the larger community we continue to offer Professional Development Day camps, Spring Break camps as well as programmed camps throughout the Summer Break.

Our 2018-19 camps programs saw another successful year. We again kept our Spring Break Camp's program at a 100% registration rate.

For our Summer Camp's program, we once again were eligible recipients of the Canada Summer Jobs Grant and the program maintained a 99% registration rate, an increase of 2% from last year.

We continued our support of the Youth Leaders In Training program which is facilitated by the City of Victoria, by taking on two Youth Volunteers. As they supported our programs, we supported them with their understandings around work ethic and the importance of relationship in community.

CAMAS EARLY YEARS CENTRE

Camas Early Years Program offers care for families with children between the ages of 2.5 and 5 years old. Predominantly held outdoors, educators focus on relationships between children and the Land, considering our way of being and living in harmony with one another, and the other-than-human beings. Early Childhood Educators offer responsive care, reflecting on our relationships as co-learners with, and about the world, alongside children. By practicing in this way, we reimagine education, and we remain open to the endless ways of seeing our world from new perspectives. We foster a space of belonging for all that enter our space. Educators work with the BC Early Learning Framework, and write pedagogical narrations to share our thinking with families and the community.

FAMILY DROP INS

Our Family Programs are supportive and inclusive. These affordable drop-in groups are perfect for making new connections for children, parents and caregivers. Exploring through play and socializing, children have the opportunity to develop mobility and social skills, and have fun. Our families have the option to have a parent discussion group, and we encourage community building by providing a heathy hot lunch to all who attend the program.

We continue to run the Family Programs at full capacity, and have added a "Friends of Porter Park" outdoor drop-in program that runs seasonally in the spring.

MOSS ROCK PRESCHOOL

FIVE POINTS PRESCHOOL

Five Points Preschool operates three days a week, Monday, Wednesday and Friday. A licensed program for 2.5-5 years old with a focus on learning through play, discovery, problem solving, socializing, and exploration. We place importance on community building and keep our parents involved through the year with potlucks and events to nourish our connections.

YOUTH

The primary goal of our Youth Zone and Chill Zone programs is to prepare our oldest ages of after school care to move on to middle school. We do this by challenging our registrants with new responsibilities in tandem with offering new freedoms. We often see a large arch from the beginning of the year to the end in terms of growth in our individuals and from the group as a whole.

In Jump N Start, we look to serve youth who are facing barriers with a free, yet enriching after school program largely out in the community. The heightened importance of having a safe and nurturing space to spend several hours a week for these pre-teens and teens is reflected in the heartfelt end-of-year feedback.

FALL FAIRFIELD

Fall Fairfield is a one-day, free event that celebrates connections at the neighbourhood level. It is a family oriented community festival located in the heart of Fairfield at Porter Park. With giant bubbles, a cardboard castle, hay bales, and harvest hats; it is a celebration of the start of the fall season. Although the weather called for rain, it subsided by the time of the event. Apart from a windy afternoon the event was a great success with over 25 interactive vendors, 4 food trucks, 5 performances, and a beverage garden. We featured our 3rd annual pie competition and added a bakery category featuring pies from Irene's Bakery, Bubby Roses, Roost Bakery, Fol Epi, Origin Bakery, and Salt Chuck Pie Compay. We had a silent auction which made over \$2000 and received donations from nearly 30 businesses! Fall Fairfield is loved by all who attend because it has a "home made" feeling that gives patrons a space to relax and enjoy connecting with their neighbours.

GIFT OF GOOD FOOD

FGCA partnered with Fernwood NRG and 15 other organizations to work together to raise \$80,000 to give 150 families access to fresh fruit and vegetables every two weeks for an entire year! We surpassed the goal raising a grand total of \$88,179. This is a great community fundraiser which directly supports families in the greater Victoria area, including 10 families right here in Fairfield Gonzales.

BOOK CLUB

Run by volunteers and attended by community members, Book Club meets monthly to discuss book selections the group has decided upon. Each Book Club meeting is framed by volunteer facilitators around a few discussion points. All voices are valued and welcomed. Book Club presents an opportunity for neighbours to meet one another and explore challenging themes while reading novels by Canadian authors.

The main foyer of Fairfield Community Place acts as a gallery space for local artists to display their work to sell to the wider community. From prints to ink, photographs to paintings; there are many different mediums used by artists on display in the foyer. Since its inception in 2014 colourful installations have decorated the centre's walls.

NEIGHBOURHOOD YARD SALE

Formerly known as Community Yard Sale Day, our Neighbourhood Yard Sale Day celebrated its 6th consecutive year. Members of the community sign up to host a yard sale at their homes in the Fairfield Gonzales neighbourhoods all on the same day. It is a way to keep items out of the landfill and encourage neighbours to reduce their waste impact. In total we raised over \$600 from over 50 registered sales and a community BBQ. It was a busy day at Fairfield Community Place as Clothing Swap, Repair Café, and the Moss St Market were running concurrently. Although it rained for most of the day it didn't dampen yard salers spirits. Community members braved the heavy drops and made the most of the experience. One sale was donating all their profits for the development of wells in Liberia, located in West Africa, so citizens have access to fresh water.

MUSIC BINGO

Leading up to Fall Fairfield, we hosted a Music Bingo Fundraiser at the Fernwood Inn to raise funds for Fall Fairfield programming. The event was held on a Wednesday night and was well attended by staff, volunteers, friends, family, and community members attended. Spirits were high as people sang along to cheesy '80s tracks, classic ballads, and music from all different genres. In total we raised nearly \$450! It was so well received by those in attendance, we know this won't be the last one!

COMMUNITY DINNERS

Through a Strategic Plan Grant from the City of Victoria, the FGCA hosted monthly Community Dinners in the Garry Oak Room from October through June. Safia from the International Women's Catering Co-op is the chef for each dinner, creating deliciously diverse dishes. The dinners are well received by the community who attend; some from Fairfield Gonzales and some from other neighbourhoods. It gives people the chance to connect, with food being the main part of what brings them together. All the volunteers came again and again because they enjoyed the food and supporting the dinner in whatever way they could.

CLOTHING SWAP

Every month the FGCA hosts a community Clothing Swap where you can bring gently used clothing and swap them for new clothes. It is a completely free service that reduces the need to buy new clothes. The Clothing Swap is well attended with returning community members contributing to the growing amount of clothing each month. The FGCA hosts 11 swaps a year with approximately 500 yearly participants. Every fourth Saturday come to Fairfield Community Place and enjoy finding some new threads.

RECONCILIATION CIRCLE

The FGCA Reconciliation Circle was formed in 2017 by a group of community members who wished to respond to the calls to action of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission of Canada. The Circle meets monthly to share thoughts and ideas and plan activities. All are welcome!

Members of the circle are currently working on three streams of action:

Build More Awareness of Indigenous Ways — We have 'seeded' little free libraries with books by Indigenous authors and hosted readings with Indigenous authors in order to celebrate the stories and perspectives of First Nations writers. We have also created a reading list which is available on the FGCA website.

Map and connect to the land – before settlementwith mapping initiatives and walks with Indigenous guides.

Be an active resource for learning and outreach - group members are sharing resources and connections, while exploring what we can enact locally from the TRC recommendations.

Blake loves to have a cup of coffee on his break and chat with the FGCA staff and likewise the staff are always eager to hear Blake's stories. The FGCA is so fortunate that Volunteer Victoria referred him to us twenty years ago. He is an important part of our community and we look forward to many more years together!

FACILITY RENTALS

This year we continued to share our community space with on-going renters such as the Moss Street Market, the Fairfield United Church, the Royal Astronomical Society, Salsa Moderna, and Soundings Vocal Ensemble. In addition, Corinne's Kitchen was rented most of the year by the International Women's Catering Co-Operative, the Samosa King and Tamales Don Carlos.

Once again Knotty by Nature hosted their popular fibre arts festival, Fibrations, on the field and the South Vancouver Island Potter's Guild held their annual pottery sale in our Garry Oak Room.

Also using the space were a number of private rentals hosting education sessions, a book launch, support groups, community meetings, a Youth Pride Dance, an All Abilities Valentine's Dance, and many birthday parties, to name just a few.

We changed the name of 'Our Place is Your Place' to 'Freebie Nights for Community Groups' and with a new poster and some advertising it became a huge success. Freebie Nights is a way for community groups to access our rooms, at no cost, on the last Monday of each month. As long as events are free and open to the public, our rooms are available for groups of 30 or less.

YOUTH & FAMILY COUNSELLORS

The FGCA employs Youth and Family Counsellors (YFCs) in ten schools in School District #61. Counsellors bring their unique talents and skills to their student population, providing individual and group counselling, social supports, life skills coaching, referrals, and other interventions that help students succeed at life and in school. Youth and Family Counsellors are often seen as the heart and soul of the school. Their caseloads are high, the issues complex, and they rise to the challenge every day.

Top concerns that Youth and Family Counsellors are seeing in their schools are:

- Stress and anxiety
- Grief and Loss
- Poverty (low income, unemployment)
- Family conflict/challenges
- Peer conflict/bullying/harassment

In collaboration with children, youth and their families the YFC provides the following services and strategies to help address these concerns:

- Individual counselling.
- Family counselling and parent/teen mediation.
- Group counselling (i.e. grief/loss, parenting, divorce, social skills, healthy lifestyle choices).
- Life skill training, which may include social skills development and conflict mediation/resolution.
- Enhancement of interrelationships between families, schools, and community.
- Ongoing consultation with teachers/community professionals.
- Crisis management intervention.
- Preventative interventions (i.e. health promotion, drug and alcohol education).
