# EXECUTIVE DIRECTORS Vanya McDonell Kristina Wilcox

The 2020-21 year continued to send us challenges and surprises. The ongoing global pandemic required patience and constant adaptation, but our work providing care, community, and connection to the neighbourhood was rewarding and enriching. We have framed our report with the four strategic priorities that the Board of Directors passed this year: People, Place, Process, and Programs.

People are the underlying force behind all of our work. People are why we do what we do, and they are how we get it done. In 2020-21 we supported people in Fairfield Gonzales in a myriad of ways: quality childcare for families, counselling for struggling children, food for those who need it, outreach for at-risk youth, and recreation for physical health. We connected community members with decision-makers through our land use meetings and town hall event. We even celebrated in the small way that we could in September 2020 with our Tiny Fall Fairfield event!

Place reflects the importance of our connection to the land and the unique character of Fairfield and Gonzales. We are all united in our gratitude for the places where we are privileged to live, work, and play, on these unceded traditional territories of the Lekwungen speaking peoples. The work of the Neighbourhood Improvement, Climate Action, Community Association Land Use, and Community Garden Committees helps to steward this land for current and future generations.

Process ensures that we do our work in a good way. This means reflecting our values of inclusion, integrity, equity, connection, collaboration, and diversity in everything we do. It also means practicing good governance. This year we updated our constitution and bylaws, an important part of making sure that we are staying on track and fulfilling our obligation to create public good.

Programs, services, and projects are the way we fulfil our mission. Despite the impacts of COVID-19, we were able to offer close to a full slate of services to our community throughout the year, with minimal disruption. We were even able to open a new program, Huckleberry Infant-Toddler Care, in the midst of it all, providing a vital and much-needed service for new families.

As we look ahead, we are filled with hope. The pandemic has taught us many lessons and enabled some rapid and positive change. We've discovered that we can adapt very quickly to respond to collective challenges, and we've found new ways to organize and mobilize community action. We want to thank our members, Board, staff, and clients for each of their contributions to our community this year!

The Board of Directors consists of up to 14 members at any one time. Board members serve two year terms and are elected each year at the AGM by the membership. Board members bring a broad range of perspective and expertise to the FGCA, and provide governance and leadership to the organization. Board members also participate in community development through committee work.

#### GOVERNANCE COMMITTEE

The Governance Committee assists the Board in fulfilling its legal, ethical, and functional responsibilities by recommending Board policies and practices. This year the Governance Committee also took on Strategic Planning activities.

#### In 2020-21, the committee:

- Worked with executive directors to pass our strategic plan.
- Held a training session for board members on policy making in September 2020.
- Amended the bylaws to add Governance chair to the executive committee in April 2021.
- Amended the Constitution to make our purposes more specific in April 2021.
- Worked to establish a town hall committee; ran a successful first town hall meeting in May 2021.
- Added a financial priority that not only ensures responsible management of the FGCA's finances, it also ensures FGCA board members will begin to spend some of the FGCA's reserved funding - all to fulfill the FGCA's strategic plans and goals.
- Are redefining executive committee roles and role of past president (March 2021 present).

### FGCA STRATEGIC PRIORITIES 2020-2025

People: Improve life for people in our community and our organization and empower them to contribute to their own and their respective community's wellbeing.

Place: Create and support vibrant, livable, beautiful, warm, safe spaces in the organization and in the broader community.

Programs, services, and projects: Deliver programs, services, and projects that are responsive to community needs, leverage community assets, and fulfil our vision, mission and purposes as a community association

#### VICTORIA COMMUNITY ASSOCIATION NETWORK (VCAN)

VCAN is a network of all of Victoria's Community Associations that meets regularly and does advocacy work on City issues. The VCAN is an important part of the neighbourhood associations in Victoria as it gives us a chance to discuss issues that affect all associations, have conversations with City staff and Council, and share best practices between our associations. The VCAN appreciates and acknowledges the City's past support and looks forward to continued cooperation.

#### STREETLIFE COMMITTEE

The Streetlife Committee fosters and supports the development implementation of street, neighbourhood, and community-wide activities and initiatives that reflect the Association's values and objectives. This group of dedicated volunteers builds and strengthens community through participatory, collaborative, and inclusive practices to bring about safe, sustainable, lively and resilient neighbourhoods. The committee of eight members met monthly via zoom with occasional in person social gatherings.

- Collaborated with a Treasure Hunt using our Community Inspiration Map in March 2021
- Discussed opportunities for using the map with community in The City's Community Engagement processes beginning in April 2021

#### COMMUNITY GARDEN COMMITTEE AND FAIRFIELD FOOD FOREST

The Fairfield Food Forest in Porter Park is a permaculture garden that grows perennial fruits, nuts, herbs and flowers. It is a commons- this means it is maintained by a group of dedicated volunteers and used by the community. The Food Forest is also a place of discovery for our Early Year programs, providing a space to encourage children and educators to explore and care for the forest.

In the fall of 2020, we planted garlic with some of the children attending the FGCA early years program. We seeded native flowers to support pollinator activity in the garden, and we continued to maintain pathways and mulch beds for the winter.

The Food Forest experienced a year of extreme weather from a record snowfall winter to scorching summer temperatures. These extremes show us the importance of healthy soil, leaf mulching, planting drought resistant plants, and supporting native plants to sustain our pollinators during harsh weather conditions.

#### COVID-19 Response:

At the Food Forest, we continue to find ways to support community connections, strengthen individual food security, and find creative ways to engage folks during the pandemic. This year we were able to support individuals through tours and private gardening sessions as well as working with groups or "cohorts" to maintain in the space while adhering to COVID protocols. One way we successfully achieved this was through more engagement with Sir James Douglas school, as the groups were large and able to do a lot of work but already identified as a cohort.

The Food Forest continues to support the city wide food security program, "Get Growing, Victoria!". Our volunteers were able to participate in the program as growers, garden experts or volunteers distributing seedlings. This program continues to be an excellent way for folks to connect around their shared interest in growing food.

Although most of our work parties were cancelled, individuals continue to be welcomed at the Food Forest on their own or in their family bubble. New participants or interested community members are offered a physically distant orientation and communication via email.

As we become stewards collecting and sowing native plant seeds in the community, we will create pollinator corridors.

#### NEIGHBOURHOOD IMPROVEMENT COMMITTEE

The Neighbourhood Improvement Committee addresses issues of social justice, environmental sustainability, the built environment, urban form, transportation, parks, and related matters so as to improve our neighbourhood. The committee met monthly on zoom, and addressed transportation, traffic calming, and built partnerships with community members working on improving their neighbourhood.

#### PLACE COMMITTEE

The Place and Programs Committee is an advisory committee that includes board members, staff, and members of the association to provide advice and guidance about FGCA programs, and the space we use for our programs. The Committee has provided advice to the FGCA Co-Executive Directors about ensuring that the organization has the space the organization needs to provide services and serve the community, in both the short and long-term. Ongoing efforts to examine possibilities are considered in relation to the organization's strategic goals. As a result of the COVID-19 pandemic, much of the program updates relating to the pandemic were reported directly to the FGCA Executive Committee and the Board of Directors.

## COMMUNITY ASSOCIATION LAND USE COMMITTEE (CALUC)

This report represents an approximation of the work the CALUC has done over the year.

The CALUC currently has seven members: Joanna Fox (Chair), David Molinski (Vice Chair), Dave Thompson, Owen Sieffert, Don Monsour and Kevin White. David Molinski stepped down from the CALUC and we thank him for his contributions and knowledge – he will be missed.

While CALUC preliminary/community meetings did pick up this past year, there were only five meetings (August, December, February, March, June) held due to less applicant activity.

Meetings were virtual via Zoom and included preliminary meetings to discuss the applicant's plans, and Community Meetings that included site specific zoning, rezoning and variances.

Land use development applications spanned from new builds to garden suites, to modular classrooms at a local school. Community engagement was extensive for the multi-unit development on 902 Foul Bay and the addition of modular classrooms and a prefabricated gymnasium tent at Glenlyon Norfolk School's Pemberton Woods campus. It should also be noted that most of the new developments continue to include appropriate bike storage, provisions for e-vehicle charging and heat pumps. Parking, traffic, tree-canopy preservation, and the development height continue to be main concerns for all developments.

The CALUC worked with the City, and other CALUCs, to ensure all notices of meetings included the provision of a virtual meeting, in addition to plans being posted on the development tracker and an opportunity for the community to provide feedback online for 30 days.

The CALUC continues to encourage applicants to engage with the community in order to get the best development possible for Fairfield Gonzales.

### FAIRFIELD OUT OF SCHOOL CARE

Fairfield OSC offers 60 after school care spaces and 40 before school care spaces for Sir James Douglas School. Our three groups do weekly out trips in the local community, daily activities, crafts, and sports to meet the interests of the children in care. This past year, some highlights included football with our older group, a Harry Potter themed week with our middle aged group, and frozen dinosaur "hatching eggs" with our youngest group.

COVID-19 Response: This past year was much different from a typical year in OSC. We stayed close by the centre during our weekly out trips, our three groups did not engage or mingle with each other in their usual way, and we adapted our usual activities a better align with public health guidelines. Despite all this, we all pulled together to make it work!

#### MARGARET JENKINS OUT OF SCHOOL CARE

At MJ OSC we offer after school care spaces for about 37 % of the school's population and many families stay with us for multiple years. We strive to create a stimulating, warm, and engaging program that aims to meet each kid's personal needs as much as possible. The afternoons are filled with lots of outdoor play time, games, crafts, visits to nearby parks and beaches as well as group building activities. This year we had a very stable and fantastic team of leaders who made a difficult year into something incredibly fun to be a part of. Our oldest group developed and performed two plays, every group designed a group flag and we managed to hold our annual carnival. The children invented a new game called "Laurenball", that still gets played every day!

COVID-19 Response: Due to lower enrolment we closed one group and only had 104 spaces instead of the usual 119. For our day to day operation we had to change some of our routines in order to provide a safe environment. Children stayed in their cohorts and OSC groups did not mingle. Parents were not allowed in the buildings and picked up from the back doors. For our out trips. we stayed within walking distance to the school. Overall the children and leaders adapted very well to the new procedures and it was a successful year.

#### CAMPS

The FGCA hosts camp programs for Professional Development Days, Spring Break, as well as Summer Camp. While operating program during COVID, we elected to expand our Camps programs in order to support more children in a safe manner. Prior to this year, the FGCA supported 60 care spaces for Pro-D in which all students from all programs gathered at 'The Place' and were welcome to register. Within the context of an ongoing pandemic, we decided to offer Pro-D care at both locations, increasing our ability to offer care by 25% or 20 spaces. The decision to host on-site camps programs was extended to the Spring Break period where we again, offered care at two locations. This led to an increase of 100% registration as well as extended our capacity to offer much needed care to the community.

Once summer came around, we centralized the program and resumed hosting camps program at 'The Place'. Following the successes of the previous year's increase in capacity, we expanded the program by another 10 care spaces. Continuing the trend of limiting our exposure to the community, we were very lucky to have many external activites come to us.

#### CAMAS EARLY YEARS CENTRE

Camas Early Years Centre offers full-time care to children aged 2.5-5 years. Predominantly focused on outdoor learning, we explore nature and the land. Camas is fortunate to be able to play and explore on the traditional lands of the Lekwungen & WSÁNEĆ peoples. Each day we pay gratitude to the opportunities we are presented with by being able to freely engage in this beautiful outdoor landscape. Camas has become a deeply rooted program that fosters children's experiences in nature, to experimentation, inquiry and collaborative learning, alongside the educators. Using the BC Early Learning Framework as our guide, educators offer responsive care. We reimagine early childhood education together with children and remain open to the many ways of seeing our world. The FGCA had new custom-built cabinets in the Camas daycare mud room. Thank you Reeceworks Carpentry!

When Camas returned to normal operation in the summer of 2020, we provided the structure and security that families required to get through this uncertain year.

#### HUCKLEBERRY INFANT-TODDLER CENTRE

Huckleberry Infant-Toddler Centre opened its doors in November 2020 as the youngest care ever offered by the FGCA, caring for children aged 10 months to 3 years. Not only does Huckleberry help to serve an underserved population, it provides another space for the families of our community to connect. As a feeder program, Huckleberry will be the beginning of a long community journey. Children will have the opportunity to attend care in the same community from the ages of 0 to 12 yrs. We believe strongly in a continuity of care as we have seen, firsthand, how it strengthens community. As they say- "it takes a village to raise a child!" The FGCA (in partnership with the City) was excited to complete the renovation of its multi-purpose family room into a new licensed daycare space complete with nap room and change room. An age appropriate playground was completed in the fall of 2020 to accommodate two daycares and a preschool. With the addition of a new daycare meant an increase in laundry needs which meant adding another washer and dryer to double our capacity. Thank you to the City for adapting the basement for the installation.

#### FAMILY DROP INS

The primary goal of our Family programs is to support and engage primary caregivers and to foster a healthy family and community life. These affordable, often free, drop-in groups are perfect for making new connections for children, parents and caregivers and create opportunities for young families to learn together through social connection. Programs use a playbased learning practice using creative play and child-focused activities. In addition, time is provided for caregivers to connect in an uninterrupted environment.

COVID-19 Response: Given the nature of these programs, there was significant interruption for a large portion of the 2020-2021 year. While the programs started indoors in the fall, we quickly had to shift to outdoor and online programming. Drop-in outdoor based programming was offered to families as well as open, online interactive sessions.

#### MOSS ROCK PRESCHOOL

The Moss Rock Preschool is a licensed preschool that runs Monday to Friday from 9am until 1pm. The preschool offers 2-5-day registrations for children 2.5-5 years of age. Moss Rock strived to give its students and families an open, welcoming, safe space that respects individual values and nurtures exploration and learning.

Moss Rock is primarily an outdoor-focused emergent curriculum, which aims to foster a connection to the natural world, build confidence in the students own abilities, and allow children's inherent inquisitive nature to develop and grow, building the scaffolding for them to be successful in life and their future endeavours in school.

With the new challenges of running an early year's program during an ongoing pandemic the Moss Rock program focused on exploration in the natural space and in the community. Our many out trips in the community included locations such as our namesake Moss Rock, Gonzales Beach, Clover Point, and St. Ann's Academy. When the Moss Rock program is in it's classroom they focus on exploration through unstructured play and process art, where children can approach the space in more imaginative ways, as they cooperatively play together.

The Moss Rock Preschool supports learning through pedagogical narrations. Educators are committed to continued learning and mentoring the next generation of Early Childhood Educators in the field as the program hosts practicum students from Camosun Collage.

#### RECREATION

#### JUMP N' START OUTREACH

The primary goal of our Youth Zone and Chill Zone programs is to prepare children in their last year of elementary school to move on to middle school. These programs offer our participants new privileges to go along with elevated responsibility. Our offsite Jump N Start program serves youth who are facing barriers and a higher need with a free and enriching after school program.

Youth Zone had always gone on huge adventures on pro d camps in the past but without the use of the public transit system, staff had to stretch the walkable resources to their limits. The final adventure of the year involved using the harbor ferries to take the group across to West Bay, just a short walk to Flying Squirrel!


Although Chill Zone does not mandate group participation, staff do take the opportunity to foster organic and voluntary. Holly had great success running theatre scripts with our 'Chill Zoners.' kids would come in looking to pick up where they left off the previous week.

Jump N Start had to say goodbye to a close-knit group of grade eights who have since moved on to high school. There were many heavy conversations about the difficulties in their lives but many more fun outings like The VR Lounge, salon, Royal BC Museum and our final ceremonial trip to close program at Thetis Lake.

COVID-19 Response: The 2020-21 school year was the first during the ongoing pandemic. Many precautions and procedures were created to meet this challenge including a comprehensive COVID-19 Safety Plan. Pickups were done outside The Youth Space entirely, children washed their hands frequently and the public transit system was avoided to name a few of the significant policy changes.

### EVENTS & PROJECTS COVID 19 RESPONSE:

The ongoing pandemic continued to present many challenges for the FGCA's events and projects. Several of our usual events were cancelled this year including Clothing Swap, Art at the Place, the Community Wide Yard Sale, and Repair Café due to government restrictions on events and activities. However, staff and volunteers were able to adapt many of our activities and continue providing valuable and needed services in a safe environment for our community.

#### BOOK CLUB

FGCA's book club meets once monthly on the last Monday of each month. The group selects books that focus on critical global issues that impact Canadians, contributes to cultural understanding, or an author's lived experiences written by Canadian authors. Two volunteer facilitators guide participants to deepen their understanding of the issues presented in each book through discussion, reflection, and consideration of how culture and diversity affect behaviour, opinions, thoughts, attitudes, and beliefs.

COVID 19 Response: The group transitioned from in-person meetings to Zoom meetings in response to the pandemic.

#### GIFT OF GOOD FOOD

The Gift of Good Food is an annual fund-raiser hosted by the Fernwood Neighbour-hood Resource Group. Together with 15 partner organizations, including the FGCA, a total of \$151, 870, far surpassing the goal of \$100,000, was raised to provide fresh produce every two weeks over the year to over 300 families throughout Greater Victoria.

#### FOOD SECURITY

Visit the Garry Oak Room on a Tuesday afternoon and you'll find Debbie, our food pantry program volunteer, sorting through boxes of fresh produce, organizing tins of canned food, and arranging bread products. She is busy transforming the lobby of the building into the weekly food pantry, a mini grocery store, for the first shoppers who arrive at 3 pm. Unlike traditional charitable food programs, participants select their own groceries including fresh fruits and vegetables, milk, yogurt, eggs, non-perishable foods, and bread.

Along with providing access to healthy, nutritious food, the program aims to educate our community about household food waste. Leftover produce that will not last until the next week's shop is transformed in tasty meals and baked goods or chopped, blanched, and frozen in small batches for participants to cook into future meals. Recipes and techniques are shared with participants regularly and program volunteers create information sheets with food storage tips and alternative uses for common foods.

The majority of food distributed through the pantry program is donated from local grocery stores including Thrifty Foods and The Root Cellar through the Mustard Seed's Food Rescue Project. We also receive donations of non-perishable food from the Give Food, Get Food Program and fresh and frozen food monthly from ColdStar Solutions. In July 2021, we began receiving weekly donations of locally grown produce from Gatton House Farms in Saanichton.

The food pantry program has been in operation since the early days of the pandemic and continues to serve between 20 to 25 individuals, families, and seniors in our neighbourhood each week. We strive to provide a comfortable, non-judgemental experience for participants, many of whom have never felt comfortable accessing other food programs in the city. We do not require proof of income to participate.

#### GET GROWING VICTORIA! SEEDLING DISTRIBUTION

Get Growing, Victoria! Is a City of Victoria program that provides food seedlings and garden materials to residents in need, including people disproportionally impacted by the ongoing pandemic. The seedlings are grown in the City's nursery in Beacon Hill Park and distributed in partnership with community organizations. We applied for and received funding through a My Great Neighbourhood Grant to purchase additional supplies for those in-need including soil, seeds, and pots.

The FGCA hosted two events to distribute seedlings and gardening supplies on August 17, 2020 and May 30, 2021. Available seedlings included:

#### BC FARMERS' MARKET NUTRITION COUPON PROGRAM

The nutrition coupon program is a healthy eating initiative that supports farmers' markets and strengthens food security across British Columbia. Community partner organizations provide coupons to lower-income families, pregnant people and seniors. Coupons can be spent at all participating farmers' markets including Moss Street, James Bay, and Esquimalt and can be used to purchase fruits, vegetables, nuts, eggs, dairy, and meat. The FGCA was awarded funding to provide \$21 worth of coupons weekly for 16 weeks to 15 participants

#### COMMUNITY DINNER

Our creative chef, Safia, created delicious, nutritious meals once monthly on the last Friday of each month from February to June. We continued with a takeout format this year as we were unable to offer a sit-down meal program as in previous years due to the pandemic. This well-loved community program provides an affordable, reliable, healthy meal once a month, improving food security of attendees, many of whom attend our other food programs, in their own neighbourhood.

#### 'TINY' FALL FAIRFIELD

Fall Fairfield is the FGCA's annual open house event celebrating the start of the harvest season. It is a family-orientated community festival located in the heart of Fairfield. This year, the event was reimagined as "Tiny Fall Fairfield", a smaller, socially distanced version of our usual event held over two time slots. Smaller groups of community members and neighbours enjoyed food, live music, harvest hat making, silent auction, community art project, and sunshine. A highlight of Tiny Fall Fairfield was a collaborative art project led by Tanya Bub. Attendees helped the artist decorate three papier-mache creatures in fun and festive style!

COVID-19 Response: Government restrictions on public events forced us to completely change the format of the event. As only 50 people were allowed in the event space, we opted to host a distributed event with small, pop-up activities happening throughout the neighbourhood.

#### OBSERVER NEWSPAPER

The Observer Newspaper is the place to find information on all the FGCA's programs and services, along with neighborhood news, local events, and businesses in Fairfield Gonzales. Shortly after the Community Association formed in 1975, the Observer was created as a way to build community through sharing stories, connecting neighbors, and celebrating where we live, a vision held true by the team that brings each issue of the Observer to print.

COVID-19 Response: With the pandemic continuing to limit our in-person offerings, we discovered the Observer newspaper, delivered directly to homes, was one of the ways we could connect with folks who live in the neighbourhood. The articles, services, resources, photos, programs and online offerings that we promoted in the Observer offered a way to engage in community when face to face gatherings proved challenging.

#### CLIMATE ACTION GROUP

The FGCA Climate Action Group was created in the Fall of 2019. It develops impactful and inclusive projects, participates in strategic policy advocacy, and supports individual and collective initiatives that address the climate crisis. This year the group researched, created and distributed two fact sheets; one on home energy efficiency and one on home retrofits. #### TOWN HALL MEETING

On April 29 we hosted a virtual Town Hall meeting, open to everyone in Fairfield Gonzales and beyond. Our panelists were Mayor Lisa Helps, Councillors Ben Isitt and Geoff Young, and Police Chief Del Manak. Community members sent in questions in advance, which covered a wide range of topics from transportation to safety. We were not able to cover every question, so FGCA representatives selected questions from each topic for the panellists as well as chose a number of questions at random. #### SUPPORT FOR THE UNHOUSED

The group now called Neighbourhood Solidarity with Unhoused Neighbours (NSUN) began as Fairfield Gonzales Support for the Unhoused (FGSU) in October 2020. A number of Fairfield Gonzales residents came together to assist unhoused people who were camping in local parks after being moved out of shelters due to reductions in occupancy due to COVID precautions. Although at times we assisted people in Gonzales and Hollywood parks, most of our efforts were in Beacon Hill Park (which we often called by its Indigenous name of Meegan).


Throughout the fall and winter we helped people with the necessities required to live outdoors; tarps and tents, sleeping pads and bags, batteries and flashlights, and pay-as-you-go credits for cellphones. Some of us regularly attended the Monday afternoon circles held near the petting zoo at Meegan and other members were frequently in the park at other times through the week forming relationships with individual campers. In January of 2021 we held an event at Meegan to ensure that any camper who wanted to be on the BC Housing list was on it.

We helped with the Community Care Tent that was an initiative of the campers themselves from January to the end of May 2021. During April and May most of the campers were moved into shelters or transitional housing. We have attempted to continue our relationship with individual campers but this has proven to be challenging as the operators of the various shelters do not welcome our involvement. In June 2021 we changed our name to be more inclusive as our group has grown to include people from other Victoria neighbourhoods (Fernwood, North Park, Quadra Village, and Saanich.)

### COMMUNITY INSPIRATION PROJECT

In the summer 2019, the Streetlife Committee decided to develop an asset-mapping project. The larger goal was to engage and inspire the community around what is positive in the neighbourhood. Local residents and stakeholders could submit feedback about how to keep improving the quality of life in Fairfield Gonzales.

### YOUTH AND FAMILY COUNSELLORS

The Fairfield Gonzales Community Association employs Youth and Family Counsellors (YFCs) who work onsite at schools in Greater Victoria. YFCs support students' connections to school, family, and peers. They work with students on mental health and social functioning, and provide support to the school community in times of crisis. YFCs also bring services into the school such as food programs, mindfulness groups, Big Brothers Big Sisters, the Peace Project, Go Girls, and many more. It was an especially demanding and challenging year with the impacts of COVID-19 being felt acutely by all of us. Student and family mental health needs have risen sharply, and many of the services provided in the community were modified, full with long waitlists, or not running at all. The incredible work of YFCs ensured that no student fell through the cracks and that our community was supported in this difficult time. Students also showed tremendous resilience and adaptability to the changes and uncertainty that we've all faced. Students who worked with YFCs showed improved school functioning, improved relationships with peers and adults, and improved healthy choices.
