It's been a huge honour to represent the FGCA as Board President for the last year, serving Fairfield and Gonzales residents with our extensive, affordable programming and other community services. This year has been marked by a comfortable calmness that has dictated the tone of our operations, which is a welcome change from years past.

In my first year as President, I've come to appreciate more deeply the huge impact the FGCA has on both Fairfield and Gonzales residents, as well as greater Victoria residents at large, in terms of providing invaluable community resources to people in every demographic and economic bracket. One huge achievement to note was our acceptance to participate in the childcare BC \$10 a day daycare project, which has made a significant difference to many families, especially in this time of financial instability. A huge congratulations is owed to Co-Executive Director, Kristina Wilcox, for writing a successful grant application that saw 600+ organizations vying for the 90 spots.

Other events of note were the dedication ceremony for the renaming of Trutch Street to Su'it (pronounced "say-eet" and meaning "truth" in the Lekwungen language), an important step toward furthering reconciliation with the traditional peoples of Vancouver Island; our successful initiative to become a living wage employer; and sending budget priority requests to the City and seeing movement on some important dossiers, such as crosswalk upgrades.

Of course, I'd also like to thank all of our staff, tremendously generous volunteers (including the entirety of the Board) and Executive Directors whose dedicated commitment continues to ensure that the FGCA is a leader in community development and improvement projects.

I cannot stress enough how proud I am to be part of such a supportive, magnanimous and community-focused organization as the FGCA and I hope to be able to continue to represent it.

This year marked 6 years in our positions as Co-Executive Directors of the FGCA. As we reflect on our time in our roles, we look back with pride and gratitude for the work we get to do and who we get to do it with. And, more specifically, that we have been able to lead this organization together.

We receive many questions about the shared ED model and how it functions. Simply put, we each hold very different operational roles but share responsibilities as they relate to fulfilling the strategic direction of the FGCA and establishing the values and ethics in which we operate and lead.

The 2021-22 year was one of great accomplishments in making life more affordable, and one we are exceptionally proud of! This year was the year the FGCA became a \$10-A-Day Child Care BC Centre and an accredited Living Wage Employer.

February 23, 2022 marked the day we signed our \$10 A Day Child Care BC Centre agreement with the Province of BC. This monumental day for our organization will forever be known as the day our world shifted as a childcare provider. We have pledged a large part of our time to advocating for accessible, equitable and quality child care programs in our community and beyond. Getting the news that we would be able to remove the financial barriers associated with childcare was a moment we will never forget. We always knew that the financial strain of childcare was a large contributing factor to family stress and well-being but there was little we could do about it, until now!

Secondly, one of the most unknown facts about the FGCA is that we employ up to 110 individuals each year. The people of this organization are what make it what it is and, as such, it is essential that we are constantly dedicating our work to improving working life for FGCA employees. In May of 2022, the FGCA became an accredited Living Wage Employer. This means that we pay an hourly wage that is at minimum the benchmark set by Living Wage BC for a family of four to get by in our city. Over the past couple of years, we have all learned that care industry workers are the pillars of our economy. Becoming a Living Wage Employer is a significant milestone on our path to ensuring staff, who hold traditionally undervalued positions, are valued and appreciated for their work.

COMMUNITY GARDEN COMMITTEE AND FAIRFIELD FOOD FOREST

At the Fairfield Food Forest this year we have had some great fun and learning in the garden by various community members. We had a school-based program through Sir James Douglas Elementary. In this program classes came out and learned about permaculture, growing food and about indigenous plants. We also had work parties throughout the year where community members came out and helped maintain the garden. The activities included pruning, weeding, planting, feeding with compost, harvesting, and edging the garden beds. People of all ages and abilities participated. A number of areas that need our focus were identified through our work including completing the deer fence, refurbishing the watering system and better signage for easy public use of the space. We are all looking forward to another year of getting outside and working together as a community to maintain this great food resource for everyone's enjoyment.

This year also brought some new projects in the neighbourhood. Community Garden Volunteer Coordinator Andrea Fritz engaged volunteers to work on Garry Oak ecosystem restoration in Porter Park, and worked with neighbours of Olive Street Commons to remove invasive species. She also began the planning stages of a new native plant garden at Memorial Crescent. Stay tuned for the installation of this new and exciting amenity!

NEIGHBOURHOOD IMPROVEMENT COMMITTEE

The Neighbourhood Improvement Committee (NIC) addresses matters relating to the built environment, urban form, transportation, parks, and related matters so as to improve the social and environmental conditions in our neighbourhood. NIC activities are driven by the interests of its members and issues brought forward by the community. NIC membership is open to all community members. Areas of focus this year have been pedestrian safety, transit advocacy, and accessibility improvements and advocacy.

NIC accomplishments this year:

- Gathered input and provided neighbourhood priorities for the City of Victoria annual budget, including transportation priorities, park and greenspace priorities, and other ideas put forward by community members to make our neighbourhood better
- Liaised with residents about dog off-leash parks
- Participated in school streets safety work spearheaded by local Parent Advisory Committees
- Met with BC Transit to successfully advocate for Fairfield Gonzales' inclusion in their next public participation process for the area
- Advocated to the CRD and the province for better transit service in Fairfield Gonzales
- Invited City staff to a walkabout at Clover Point to discuss improving accessibility
- Publicized accessibility problem reporting through ConnectVictoria app to FGCA members

GOVERNANCE COMMITTEE

The Governance Committee assists the Board in fulfilling its legal, ethical, and functional responsibilities by recommending policies and practices. The Governance Committee makes recommendations on Terms of Reference, organizational and Board policies, and constitution and bylaws. The committee also works on Board functions such as recruitment, training, and overall functioning. This year several new members from the community joined and have been lending invaluable perspective and expertise to the work of this committee.

Governance accomplishments this year:

- Brought forward bylaw changes regarding past president role to October 2021 AGM (defeated).
- Drafted new organizational policy on bullying and harassment, accessibility, and social media, and updated compensation policy
- Created Past President job description
- Restructured the Garden Committee from a committee of the board to a community committee
- Updated Board competency, skills, experience and demographics matrix

COMMUNITY ASSOCIATION LAND USE COMMITTEE (CALUC)

This report represents an approximation of the work the CALUC has done over the year. The CALUC currently has six members: Joanna Fox (Chair), Ashley Fernandes (Vice Chair), Dave Thompson, Owen Sieffert, Michael Hirsch and Don Monsour. Kevin White and Julie Edney stepped down from the CALUC and we thank them for their contributions and knowledge.

The CALUC continues to encourage applicants to engage with the community to get the best development possible for Fairfield Gonzales, whether at formal meetings or in casual discussions, and regularly connects community members with applicants.

Preliminary/community meetings were held either virtually or in a combination of virtual/inperson setup, with more than 80 community members joining one on-line session for a multi-unit development application. Applications ranged from small-house rezoning to duplex/quadplex/multiunit developments. Judging from the number of community responses on the City's development tracker comment option, Fairfield Gonzales residents have strong feelings around land use.

In addition to hearing land use applications, the CALUC:

- added an accessibility lens to its discussions with all applicants and addressed the City's accessible parking bylaw thanks to in-depth research on accessibility by a community member
- was asked by the FGCA's Climate Committee to address climate action issues with applications, such as drought-resistant landscaping
- provided input to the City's Downtown Core Area Plan Design Guidelines
- heard the City's first proposal of a Density Land Transfer Agreement.

The agreement - between The Land Conservancy of British Columbia (TLC) which owns Abkahzi Gardens and Aryze - would officially downzone the Abkhazi Gardens lands to a zone that maintains current activities on the site while ensuring the site receives its official heritage designation and protecting it from redevelopment. Aryze proposes to utilize less than 30% of the 35,000 square feet of available density being transferred from the Abkhazi Garden site, for its proposed development, and the balance would be released and secured as a financial donation to TLC

MARGARET JENKINS OUT OF SCHOOL CARE (OSC)

During the 2021/2022 school year we operated 64 spots for before school care and 119 spots for after school care on Margaret Jenkins school grounds. The biggest challenge during this school year was staffing. While we had excellent leaders, we also had a lot of changes and were short staffed many days. The children and families dealt with all the changes amazingly well but we would have liked more consistency for all the groups. At spring break, we made the difficult decision to close the "Saturna" group of 13 grade 5 and 2 grade 4 children. Luckily, we could offer them spots in our youth program at the Community centre. One leader picked the children up at Margaret Jenkins School and together they took public transit to the Place. This was so successful that we are continuing that model for grade 5 students for the 2022/2023 school year.

Despite those challenges we managed to keep our well loved traditions going. The annual carnival, developing theatrical productions, Friday sign up days and the year end water play day were all well attended. Here at MJ OSC we strive to create a safe, fun and supportive environment where kids can play and get exposed to different activities.

FAIRFIELD OUT OF SCHOOL CARE

Fairfield OSC saw another successful year of program. With 60 spaces for children to attend in the afternoon and 40 spaces in the morning. Fairfield OSC continues to be in high demand for afternoon care and operates with full registration as well as a handful of families who access the drop-in service on a near daily basis. In the morning, we have 35 children who attend Monday to Friday, which continues to be a consistent number over the past years even though there are registered spaces which have been left unfilled. One of the program highlights for this year was when we were able to implement the new fee structure, capping fees to \$200 a month, which led to many positives for both our parents and to a greater extent, the community at large.

CAMPS

The FGCA facilitated Pro-D and Spring Break camps for 40 children on-site at École Margaret Jenkins School as well as Sir James Douglas Elementary. The program is consistently attended at full capacity for all six Pro-D camps as well as the two-week Spring Break program. Summer Camps program were in high demand this year as we were able to introduce the \$10 a day childcare initiative. While this was an exciting development, our capacity of 60 care spaces meant that we were only able to serve roughly a third of our registered school aged population.

FAMILY DROP-INS

FGCA Family programs support and engage primary caregivers to foster a healthy family and community life. The programs provide nutritional support, parenting resources, appropriate and age developmental activities for children and families. The increasingly popular family programs, such as Parent & Tot and Kindergym are great places for learning and socialization for both caregivers and children in a safe, supportive, uninterrupted environment. In addition, our facilitators are the instrument of guidance and support through the sharing of first-hand knowledge and experience.

YOUTH

The 2020-21 school year was largely about returning children to environments and care as close to those prepandemic as possible. This year was about navigating lifting Covid 19 measures as well as expansion in some areas of need. Every other program eventually was able to operate much as they had in 2019, including a one-week spring break camp which had not been run in years.

The most exciting development in Youth Programs this year was the launch of an evening drop-in program on Friday's in January. Greatest of All Time (G.O.A.T.) Zone was successfully launched in January for underserved middle-schoolers in Fairfield and beyond. Intended to fill a gap for middle school-aged youth, this drop-in is *only* for that age group (grades 6-8) and takes place after Chill Zone on Friday nights, 6:30-9:30pm.

Youth Zone is our registered Monday to Wednesday program that involves structured programming. Youth Zone registrations were way up year-over-year, likely because of continued progress through Covid 19 and our influx of children from Margaret Jenkins kids in April.

Chill Zone is our free- or by donation - drop in program for grades 5-8 which takes place on Thursday and Friday. Jump N Start (JNS) is our registered special after school program for youth who have are deemed at risk due to various factors. A Youth and Family Counsellor from their respective school selects them to attend the program.

HUCKLEBERRY INFANT-TODDLER CENTRE

Huckleberry Infant-Toddler Centre is the youngest care offered by the FGCA, caring for children aged 10 months to 3 years. This program is often the starting point of 'continuity of care' in the same community from the ages of zero to 12 years, for children in our community. Huckleberry program emphasizes building relationships through play and inquiry; to each other, to the community, and to the land. Nature plays a big role in our daily programming and how we can respect our land. Through daily exploring and playing in our natural environments, the children learn about themselves, their peers, and the habitat in which they live.

CAMAS EARLY YEARS CENTRE

Camas Early Years Programs offers care for families with children between the ages of 2.5 and 5 years old. Predominantly focused on outdoor learning, we explore nature and the land. Camas is fortunate to be able to play on the traditional lands of the Lkwungen & Wsanec People. We have become a deeply rooted program that fosters children's experiences in nature to allow for experimentation inquiry and collaborative learning alongside educators. At Camas, we foster an inclusive environment and find ways to create a sense of belonging for those children, families, and educators who attend our program.

At Moss Rock, we believe that our environment is one of our greatest educators which is why we practice a play-based, emergent curriculum that is primarily outdoors-focused.


GENDER GENERATIONS PROJECT

Since 2017 we have worked with local transgender youth and their allies and supporters to help deliver arts-based retreats. These multi-day retreats connect transgender, non-binary, 2-spirit, and gender-diverse youth to adult mentors with lived experience. Leaders create a safe and nurturing environment where youth are free to create, express themselves, and connect with others. Previous projects created by youth at these retreats include an art exhibit at UVic's Legacy Maltwood Gallery and a book, Growing up Trans: In Our Own Words, which was published in 2021.

GET GROWING! VICTO-

Get Growing! Victoria is a City of Victoria program that provides food seedlings and garden materials to residents in need, including people disproportionally impacted by the pandemic. The seedlings are grown in the City's nursery in Beacon Hill Park and distributed in partnership with community organizations. We also received funding to purchase additional supplies including soil, seeds, and pots. The FGCA hosted two events to distribute seedlings and gardening supplies, in the Spring and Summer.

REPAIR CAFÉ FAIRFIELD

The Fairfield Repair Café is a local community-based group of volunteers who help the public repair personal goods ranging from household appliances, to tools, toys, jewelry, clothing, furniture, bicycles and anything else you can think of. Anything one can physically bring in is fair game. It comes under the umbrella of the Repair Café organization started in Amsterdam by Martine Potsma in 2009. The intent is to reduce waste, reduce consumption, and pass on repair skills. An important side benefit is bringing the community together, especially finding relevant connections with seniors. After a long hiatus due to the pandemic, Repair Café returned in July 2022.

FOOD SECURITY

Since 2020, the FGCA has significantly increased its food programs to respond to the needs in the community. By partnering with various non-profits, businesses and the City of Victoria, our organization has become a major food hub in the neighbourhood. We have mainly focused on redistributing rescued food to food insecure families, but not only.

Almost every day of the week, rescued perishable and non-perishable food is available at the center. Our twice weekly food distribution programs, along with our outdoor food pantry and indoor freezer are open to anyone who identifies as food-insecure. The donated food comes from The Food Share Network, Starbucks, Coldstar and community members.

In 2021, we have developed our offerings of local food, either grown here or offered by local organizations. Thanks to new partnerships such as Gatton Farms, BC Farmer's Markets Coupons, Backpack Buddies, and older ones like Good Food Box, Gift of Good Food and our Food forest, more families have been able to access food.

Because we know that we cannot offer the variety of food people need every week, we continue to provide grocery gift cards to individuals and families. This way, people are able to purchase meat, fish or gluten-free food for example.

BOOK CLUB

FGCA's book club meets once monthly on the last Monday of each month. The group selects books that focus on critical global issues that impact Canadians, contributes to cultural understanding, or an author's lived experiences written by Canadian authors. Two volunteer facilitators guide participants to deepen their understanding of the issues presented in each book through discussion, reflection, and consideration of how culture and diversity affect behaviour, opinions, thoughts, attitudes, and beliefs. NEIGHBOURHOOD SOLIDARITY WITH UNHOUSED NEIGHBOURS (NSUN)

This group was created in 2020 as people were moved out of shelters and had to camp in parks. It was originally made of Fairfield Gonzales neighbours, but now includes people from all across town. The purpose of NSUN is to actualize housing justice and inclusive communities throughout Greater Victoria through solidarity and mutual aid. A group of a dozen Victoria housed and unhoused residents gather twice a month to organize help for those who need it. Their meetings are on Zoom or in person, outdoors. The FGCA coland manages donations lects through our CanadaHelps page. We also provide them with a Zoom account to use, and help with promotion through our social media accounts. The group is still recruiting new members, contact us for more information.

YOUTH & FAMILY COUNSELLORS

The Fairfield Gonzales Community Association employs Youth and Family Counsellors (YFCs) who work onsite at schools in Greater Victoria. YFCs support students' connections to school, family, and peers. They work with students on mental health and social functioning, bring in community services, and provide support to the school community in times of crisis. Many of the organizations that serve vulnerable youth and families are full or difficult to access, and YFCs are often filling this gap for kids who need support. Success can look like keeping students in school, keeping them housed, or teaching them coping schools to manage day to day.

This year we had three new YFC positions from March to June, each serving multiple elementary and middle schools within a 'family of schools.'

These positions showed promise as they were able to connect with families who may have otherwise fallen through the cracks. This model was not renewed for the following year but may help the school district understand how to best deliver support to these schools.

Top concerns that Youth and Family Counsellors are seeing in their schools are: stress and anxiety, grief and loss, poverty, family conflict, trauma, mental health concerns, social skills challenges, parenting capacity
